The University of Minnesota is committed to making our world-class education a great value for Minnesota families. Under the University of Minnesota Promise Scholarship (U Promise), eligible Minnesota resident undergraduates with a family income of up to \$120,000, who enroll at any of the University's five campuses, will be guaranteed a U Promise Scholarship. Students must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to be eligible.

The University has [reciprocity agreements](#) with the states of Wisconsin, North Dakota, South Dakota, and the province of Manitoba, Canada. Resident of any of these states or province may qualify for reciprocity tuition rates, which are lower than nonresident tuition rates and, in some cases, comparable to resident rates. In addition, Duluth and Morris campuses participate in the [Midwest Student Exchange Program](#), which allows residents of Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, or Ohio to attend at a discounted rate. Costs are estimated for planning purposes. Final housing and fees are estimates and will be determined each summer prior to the new academic year by the Board of Regents.
